

# Kent County Opioid Task Force Meeting Thursday, November 14, 2019 12:00 – 1:30 PM

#### Introductions

#### **Subcommittee Updates:**

#### **Treatment and Recovery** (Amanda Tarantowski)

- Continuing to extend MAT in KC correction facility
  - Currently any individual receiving suboxone on outside can get it in jail, as well as anyone receiving care from Cherry Health
  - Two other smaller providers face practical barriers, hoping to be resolved quickly
- Project ASSERT
  - 2 recovery coaches at Spectrum through Network 180
  - Identify and work with individuals who come in with substance use
  - Both employees have left new job postings
- Survey to individuals in community regarding barriers to MAT
  - o Barriers to access, compliance with treatment, etc.
  - Use this information to resolve issues and reduce barriers
  - Still determining who to send (MAT providers, community stakeholders, FAN, etc.)

### **Prevention** (Joann Hoganson)

- Hire a new health educator for adolescents in high school
  - High schools with large number of at-risk students
  - New health educator hired Botvin Life Skills being taught
    - Communication skills, perception of risk, peer pressure, self-esteem
  - Full agenda of classes in a number of schools
- Showing of "Danger of the Game"
  - Not a whole lot of progress

- OK Black conference still working with them to figure out how to show it
  - Also include a cue to action video
- # of emergency departments doing fentanyl screening
  - o Dr. Bora spoke with local emergency departments about overdose
  - Fentanyl is so commonly found in heroin that it is close to 100%, there is less of a need for screening, and we can assume that all heroin includes fentanyl

### Intervention (Marsha Mooney)

- Developed flyer that will be sent out to community via email and placed strategically throughout town
  - Ask to tell their recovery story (in whatever format they are comfortable with)
- Pennsylvania safe injection sites are not a violation of the Controlled Substance Act:

  - Steve Alsum wanted this mentioned
- Fatality Review Board
  - o A lot of momentum opioid fatality review in Michigan currently does not exist
- Screening tool has been proposed to Spectrum offices
- A3 thinking and updating
  - Project management tool
  - o 30-60-90-day tool, but current A3s are about a 6-month time frame
  - Intervention subcommittee doing monthly phone calls (check-in every 2 weeks)

### Data Report (Rachel Jantz)

- Data was last pulled at the end of October (data through September)
- Medical examiner data (lag in data due to ongoing investigations)
  - o 62 total overdose deaths among Kent County residents in 2019; 50 have been opioid-related
  - 39 years is the average age
  - 79% of overdose deaths are polysubstance; 68% included fentanyl; 20% had prescription opioids
  - o January 2018 September 2019
    - Rate of males is twice that of females
    - Age group variations
  - Majority of opioid deaths are unintentional
  - 2016-2017 saw a 67% increase in overdose deaths but has been decreasing since
  - Kent County compared to Washtenaw and Ingham County because of convenient monthly reporting on opioid overdose
  - There have been fewer deaths involving fentanyl since 2017, but percent of all overdose deaths including fentanyl has increased
  - Percentage of cocaine overdose deaths involving fentanyl have increased

#### **Data Discussion**

- Drug court has seen an increase in meth cases, but this is not yet being seen in overdose deaths
  - o The United States southwest has seen an increase in methamphetamine overdose deaths
- APHA (Susan DeVuyst Miller): meth/opioids and cocaine/opioids have increased
- Sgt. Witkowski: Lacing or cutting cocaine with fentanyl there is a "better high"
  - o Increase in cocaine being cut or laced with fentanyl
    - 2 cases this week, one resulted in death
  - Meth has also been increasing

- o This last week has had a lot of overdoses, 1 fatal
- When substances make it to the market you don't know what's in it and how much
  - A lot of variables, we don't know who is using these substances
- Request for prevalence rates in future reports from Dr. Ken Fawcett
  - o Rachel: CDC WONDER 2018 data will be available in January
- 2016 was the change in prescription laws which could possibly contribute to the 2017 increase in overdose deaths

### **Community Partner Highlight: Cherry Health** (Lindsay Metts)

- Recovery management/Family Engagement Therapy
  - Last stop for people who have been through treatment multiple times and continue to struggle with some sort of substance use disorder
  - Community based program outreach to clients/consumers on the case load
    - Therapist
    - Recovery coach
    - Meet people where they are at physically and also in terms of recovery
      - Might still want to use
    - Goal: work through recovery to at least a point of harm reduction help place barriers in their path to reduce the impact of their substance use
      - Housing
      - Income
      - Family/relationship
      - Community support
      - Mental health and substance use disorders (most co-occurring with some sort of trauma)
    - Two recovery management teams
      - One on Leonard, one on south side
      - Family Engagement Therapy (south side) community outreach to clients
        - Team also has a case manager work closely with additional services/programs
        - Focuses solely on mothers and their children (other programs work with single fathers- recovery management)
          - o E.g. getting children to school
        - At least one child, a year or older
        - Have to be living with mother at least 50% of time to be eligible for program
        - Works closely with DHHS and CPS to take the cases
        - Currently openings for both recovery management and FET
        - Take referrals from Network 180, team at Cherry determines appropriateness and plan for care
        - Doctors from Cherry Health also refer to the program
        - Take self-referrals, if a client needs it send them our way

#### **Round Table Discussion**

- Where providers exist across the continuum of prescribing
  - 13-fold differential in heavy vs. light prescribers
  - Scorecards and evidence-based prescribing guidelines for Spectrum providers
    - Prescribing is down 20% rules have resulted in changes to prescribing habits, but giving people data will further diminish prescribing

- ALTO 15 different hospitals, opioid exposure to naïve patients has been reduced by 25-48% in Spectrum emergency rooms
- Mercy and Trinity EPIC to go live January 25<sup>th</sup>
  - Will have mandatory opioid screening in EPIC
  - o Trinity has similar ALTO program to Spectrum
  - St. Mary's: dispensing Narcan from ED provider's discretion
    - Outpatient pharmacy creates full kits, 200 dispensed so far
    - 0.4mg vials (2 in each kit) just over \$20 (cheaper than nasal)
- Megan Rocha-Adams Red Project
  - Working with Wayne State to increase services in jail and access to naloxone
  - Expanding law enforcement wellness check program with GRPD
- Amber Hubbell KISD
  - o No one registered for opioid panel (Oct. 11) so postponed indefinitely
    - KCOTF Community Panel Discussion
  - End of September, all 21 districts received funding instructions to create health and wellness teams
    - Teams were provided with opioid curriculum
- Eloy Baez Fernandez Hispanic Center of West Michigan and Auxilio!!!
  - Interpretation/translation services
  - o Substance use disorder program aimed at Latino community
  - Every Thursday at 6:30-8:00 peer support group at KCHD
    - Open up to community once a month, agencies come in to talk about services and resources
- Steve Redmond Recovery Allies of West Michigan
  - Celebration approximately 50-60 people at Salvation Army Rec Center
    - Had a lot of educational information and other agencies
- Brett Gingrich Heart of the City Pharmacy at Cherry Health
  - Met monthly quota from wholesaler of suboxone
  - Oct 20 end of month, no new prescriptions
  - o Increase of suboxone prescriptions, needed to prove to wholesaler that scripts were legitimate
    - Lumped into opioid thresholds and monthly limits
- Lindsay Belcastro <u>RIYCC.org</u> (recovery yoga, currently at Alano Club)
  - o Anyone in drug court or sobriety court, yoga is free
  - Wednesdays at 7:00pm
  - Yoga recovery training
  - o Plans to build a healing center and offer three classes a week
    - Submitted grant wants support and clients
- Becca Newman Wayne State
  - Working with first responders and Red Project to increase connection for people who have had an overdose reversal – encourage them to seek recovery and follow-up with them
  - Expanding services at Kent County Correctional Facilities
    - Case manager discharge planning (w/ Narcan kit)
      - Meet with Red Project recovery coach
    - Improving care
    - Ecosystem communities of practice
      - Stakeholders would meet regularly and twice annually they would do a combined meeting

  - 3 IOP programs offered throughout the day
- Keila Pieters Calvin University Center for Social Research
  - Policy evaluation for naloxone standing order policy
  - Shaping evaluation and drafting research questions
  - o Looking for way to measure the standing order effect and what data can be used
  - Will be conducting focus groups early next year
- Erica Bradley Cherry Health
  - o Working on delivering methadone to all clients in jail
- Joann Hoganson KCHD
  - Families Against Narcotics (FAN) meeting December 3 at 6:00pm at St. Mark's (134 Division Ave.)
  - KCHD nurses will be delivering free naloxone training prior to the meeting
    - Everyone that participates will receive Narcan for free (no ID)
- Kristl Smith Spectrum Health
  - More prescriber waivers
  - Numbers have gone up (a little bit)
  - o Pregnant women with opioid use disorder
- MDHHS student loan repayment program (MIOTA)
