

Senior citizens are the biggest consumers of prescription medications.

The average senior citizen takes four prescribed medications per day not counting vitamins and other over-the-counter medications. If you have leftover, unwanted, or expired medications of any kind, dispose of them properly to protect the environment and prevent unintentional poisonings or abuse.

Safely dispose of unwanted or expired over-the-counter and prescription medications by taking them to a pharmacy participating in the West Michigan Take Back Meds program.

Items accepted include:

- Cold and flu medications
- Antibiotics/steroids
- Medication samples
- Non-controlled prescription medications
- Vitamins/herbal supplements
- Pet medications
- Medicated ointments/lotions

Narcotic pain killers and prescribed, controlled medications (e.g. Codeine, Ritalin, Xanax, Ambien, Vicodin, etc.)

<u>must</u> be taken to a local law enforcement agency.

Certain restrictions may apply at any of the drop off locations. Call the drop site you plan to use for more information on what items are accepted.



Disposal Instructions

- 1. Bring pills and liquids in their original containers to any participating pharmacy.
- 2. Block out **ALL** identifying personal information on the prescription label.
- 3. Do not remove the name of the medication.
- 4. The pharmacist must be able to see the medication type so he/she can properly sort and dispose of it.
